#### PRENATAL AND EARLY CHILDHOOD HEALTH

#### The Rhode Island Department of Health (RIDOH)

This state agency ensures access to quality maternal and child health services that support healthy birth outcomes, positive child development, school readiness, and preparation for adulthood. The Department of Health encourages all parents to: Programs include:

#### **NEWBORN SCREENING**

Babies often appear healthy at birth and serious problems can be prevented if disorders are discovered early. RI birthing hospitals screen every baby for 33 conditions, as well as hearing loss and critical heart issues.

#### **EARLY INTERVENTION**

Early Intervention supports families of infants and toddlers with a developmental disability or delay. This program mentors families so that children can develop to their fullest potential.

#### **Rhode Island's Early Intervention Program**

Children referred to the Early Intervention Program receive a comprehensive developmental evaluation to determine if they are eligible. There is no cost to families for these services.

Eligibility: Children must be under age 3 and have a delay in one or more areas. Children do not have to be eligible for RI Medicaid to receive services. Talk with an Intake Coordinator at your local EI center to learn more.


#### **RI DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES (DHS)**

This state agency delivers critical support services to ensure that individuals and families in RI have access to the supports they need to achieve their goals.

#### The Rhode Island Medicaid Program

The RI Medicaid Program pays for medical and health related services for eligible Rhode Islanders. DHS oversees this coverage for low-income individuals, families, children, pregnant women, elders and persons with disabilities and special needs who otherwise might not be able to pay for or get access to affordable health care.

Eligibility depends on a variety of factors including income, age, health care needs and, for certain programs, your resources, or assets. You must be a RI resident and meet specific citizenship status requirements. Learn more about eligibility at: www.eohhs.ri.gov/Consumer/FamilieswithChildren



### **MEDICAID INSURANCE PLANS**

MANAGED CARE ORGANIZATIONS

The Affordable Care Act allows RI to improve access to quality health care by offering free health care through insurance providers known as Managed Care Organizations.

Families who are eligible for Medicaid have a choice of managed care plans. All these plans offer the same essential benefits through large networks of providers. Each plan also offers a special Care Management Program to assist with care coordination to help arrange transportation or other services.

#### CHILDREN'S MEDICAID HEALTH PROGRAMS

All children under age 21 enrolled in Medicaid are eligible for preventive and routine health care as well as medically necessary specialized care and services.

## EARLY AND PERIODIC SCREENING, DIAGNOSIS AND TREATMENT BENEFITS (EPSDT)

This healthcare benefit ensures all children and adolescents get appropriate specialty services when needed. These services are provided during regular well-child visits with the doctor.

- Assess and identify problems early
- Check children's health at *periodic*, age-appropriate times
- Provide physical, mental, developmental, dental, hearing, vision, and other screening tests to find potential problems
- Perform diagnostic tests to follow up when a risk is found
- Health care services and treatments that maintain or improve physical and mental illnesses or conditions

### MEDICAID BENEFITS FOR CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL HEALTH CARE NEEDS

#### **CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL HEALTH CARE NEED (CSHCN)**

Rhode Island's Medicaid offers CSHCN extra specialized services that might otherwise be unavailable.

These services become available when a child has been diagnosed with a chronic condition <u>and</u> are determined eligible for: Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Katie Beckett <u>or</u> Adoption Subsidy through the Department of Children, Youth, and Families (DCYF).

#### **DURABLE MEDICAL EQUIPMENT (DME)**

DME is equipment or devices used for medical or rehabilitative purposes in the home or community. DME is a benefit available for children if medically necessary. Prior authorization is required. Examples of DME are diapers, nutritional supplements, respiratory supplies, assistive technology, or mobility supports.

Families can access DME Services by working with their doctor and specialists to determine what equipment is needed and calling a durable medical equipment vendor who participates in their health plan. The vendor will evaluate the child's needs and help you get the necessary documentation to the health insurance provider for review and approval.

#### **Katie Beckett**

Katie Beckett provides Medicaid health coverage to children up to age 19 who are living at home and have complex health needs. This benefit is typically used when a child has coverage under a commercial health plan. Katie Beckett provides Medicaid to help to cover the costs of additional services not covered by the commercial insurance plan.

With Katie Beckett, only the child's income and resources, not the parents', are used to determine eligibility.

To be eligible for Katie Beckett, a child must:

- Require a level of care at home that is typically provided in a hospital or nursing facility
- Meet the Social Security Administration's definition of disability
- Live at home and meet the income and resource requirements
- Be a RI resident and U.S. citizen or eligible non-citizen

Before applying, talk with a Katie Beckett Parent Consultant to confirm eligibility criteria and review the application process.

#### **Medicare Part D (Prescription Drugs)**

Young adults with special needs may be eligible for Medicare Prescription Drug Plan (Part D) assistance. The RI Office of Healthy Aging can help disabled adults sign up for this benefit. (401) 462-3000

The Federal SSI program provides monthly cash payments to families of children with physical, developmental, and/or mental impairments. If a child is found eligible for SSI due to a disability, then they are also eligible for Medicaid. (800) 772-1213

The Respite Program allows parents or quardians caring for a child with disabilities to have time off. To be eligible for Respite, a child must need an institutional level of care.

Both PASS & Respite services can help improve a child's ability to accomplish activities of daily living, improve safety skills, and participate in social situations. Services are provided in the home or community setting by a direct support worker.

Families have a choice in how services are delivered. Parents/ quardians find their own direct support worker with assistance from a certified PASS or Respite agency. Families are expected to help train and supervise their direct support worker.




